We also had stalls (with mini displays) at the Westoe Fair and The Armed Forces Covenant Exhibition at Bents Park. The latter event also focused on the Libraries WW1 project 'South Tyneside Remembers' and proved a big success with the public.

A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!



Christmas Stories

It was early on Christmas Day 1922 when six year old Vera Young (my late Mother) ran downstairs at her home in Roman Road, South Shields, to see what gifts Father Christmas had left for her. She had so dearly wanted a pram for her much loved doll Dulcie and so it was with great disappointment that there was no sign of one amongst the other gifts. However, all was not lost (or so she thought) for as she hurriedly unpacked her stocking, she found a note from Father Christmas. It explained that the pram was too large to push down the chimney and so the old gentleman had left it at Saville's Music Store in King Street for Vera to collect.

An hour latter Vera was walking along Ocean Road to King Street with her sister Muriel, aged thirteen. They passed J. W. Pollard, the shop and builder's merchant, paint manufacturer and glazier owned by their father Alfred Ernest Young, which, like most other shops, was closed. Soon they arrived at Saville's, whose proprietor, being Jewish, was one of the few shopkeepers to stay open over the Christian festival. I can hardly imagine little Vera's dismay when a shop assistant told her that the pram was not in the





shop - and of course never had been. Needless to say, Vera cried bitter tears all the way home.

However it was Vera's sister, my aunt Muriel, whom I always felt the most sorry for. She was old enough to know that Vera would not find the pram in the shop and yet she had to console the sobbing Vera whilst suffering her own embarrassment, for she, as an accomplished pianist and later music teacher, was well known at Saville's, where she frequently purchased sheet music.

This sad story was related to me many times and was always treated as a huge joke, especially by my grandfather, Alfred Ernest. However I could never see the funny side. Alfred Ernest was a successful businessman and could have well afforded to buy his beloved little daughter a pram.

Why he did not do so, is even more difficult to understand in light of his earlier experiences of a tragic Christmas. It was on Christmas Day 1884 that his thirty-seven year old widowed mother Sarah Young (née Pollard) died at 98 Livingstone Street, South Shields. I often heard the poignant story of how the family immediately went into mourning and her children Alfred Ernest (aged six), his sisters Sarah (13) and Ann (8), and his brothers Henry (10) and Thomas (4) had to take down the Christmas tree. According to her death certificate Sarah died of Phthisis Pulmonalis (now better known as Mycobacterium Tuberculosis) after two years of lung-related illnesses. I was always told that she had died of a broken heart, which I suppose sentimentalised in true Victorian fashion the tragic fate of a broken family.

My great grandfather, Thomas Young, a Tyne Pilot, had drowned when his coble 'Pilot' capsized on the Black Midden Rocks at the mouth of the Tyne during a severe storm on the 14th October 1881. He was subsequently pronounced dead in the medical room at the Lifeguard Station on the Pier. My grandfather Alfred Ernest, five years old at the time, often related this tragic event to me, even when I was very young. He remembered seeing his father laid out in his coffin at the family home, 3 Blumer's Terrace, his head padded with cotton wool to conceal the shocking fracture across his skull. Thomas and Sarah are buried in Westoe Cemetery together with their youngest child Thomas Young, who died in 1901 aged 21, of the same disease as his mother. The grave is numbered 1248 in Section 13 D of the cemetery and the gravestone includes a relief of the coble, 'Pilot'.

On a happier note, my grandfather, Alfred Ernest loved Christmas and ensured that I together with my sister Lynda shared in all its joy and excitement. He spent months planning the celebration and spared no expense, but more than anything else, he always gave generously of his love and time to us and was well supported by his wife Cissy, my grandmother. Right until his death in 1961, when I was fourteen years old, my parents, sister and I always spent Christmas Day with them at the family home in Clifton Avenue. Although Vera never received her doll's pram, my grandparents did buy one for me when I was six years old!

A Century of Service – Animals in War


I'm delighted to report that I've been sent an Australian Post Office souvenier depicting the work of 'The Man with the Donkey' at Gallipoli. The Shields' lad is known as Simpson in Australia because he enlisted under the name 'Simpson' for reasons outlined in my book 'John Simpson Kirkpatrick - The Untold Story of the Gallipoli Hero's Early Life'.

The souvenier consist of envelope with two stamps and inside is a copy of a letter written to his mother in South Shields, dated February 1915. The photograph on the envelope doesn't depict 'Simpson and his donkey', but one of the stamps does.

The Australian troops were sent to Egypt to train, prior to taking part in the Gallipoli Landings of April, 1915. However, 'Simpson' and his Aussie mates didn't know this at the time.

Just a line to let you know that we are leave ing Egypt today I dont know where we are bound for but hope that it will be England or France Now Mother you will have to excuse short note as we are all in a hustle and bustle to get the transports waggons packed and leave this afternoon So with love to you and Annie



Xmas Gifts at the Library





Chairman's Challenge

Last month's Challenge concerned a property on the Westoe Park Estate, and the Challenge went as follows. In the late 1800's it was decided that there was a demand for more large residences forming an extension to Westoe Village in an easterly direction. One of these mansions, completed in 1887, was bought by a Mr. Henry Chapman, a member of the well-known Chapman family. He lived in the house until 1920, when it was sold to George Readhead, a member of another well-known family. Subsequently it was rented out for several years from Lady Readhead by the Missions to Seamen as accommodation for cadets training at the Marine and Technical College. In 1953 the house was bought from the Readhead family by another organisation, and the Challenge is what was the name of that organisation?

The organisation which occupied the house as its local Headquarters was the Boys Brigade, and they occupied the premises until the late 1970's.

Once again there were no attempts at the solution.

As our December meeting is the annual quiz at the Westoe Cricket and Rugby Club's club-house, there is no Challenge this month, just the annual quiz which, this year, is slightly different. So put on your thinking caps and I'll see you there.
